others in Scripture had also seen God's throne, example:

Ezekiel (Ezekiel 1:26, 10:1) Daniel (Daniel 7:9) and the Apostle John (Revelation 4:1-11). In the of Revelation God's throne is specifically mentioned more than 35 times.

We can only truly 'see' ourselves once we have 'seen' God.

at times of political and social discontent and instability an elevated perspective is the big miracle: For the most part king Uzziah had ruled very well for fifty-two years. Although he started well, he did not finish well. He fell victim to vanity, to his own pride.

Uzziah had committed the **sin of presumption** – he intruded upon the priestly office.

Embracing aloneness – the secret place of the Father who sees

...so that you do not appear to men to be fasting, but to your **Father who is in the secret place**; and your Father who sees in secret will reward you openly". Matthew 6:3-4, 6, 18 (NKJV) accepting **transcendence** over immanence –

embracing the **Kingdom** (throne / sovereignty) over immediate national crisis. The temptation to dethrone God becomes greater as pressure to survive mounts.

being **bold** yet reverential -

"Let us therefore come boldly to the throne of grace, that we may obtain mercy and find grace to help in time of need."

Hebrews 4:16 NKJV)

"Let us therefore, receiving a kingdom that is firm and stable and cannot be shaken, offer to God pleasing service and acceptable worship, with modesty and pious care and godly fear and awe; For our God [is indeed] a consuming fire. [Deut. 4:24] Hebrews 12:28-29 (AMP)

firstly: a vision of God, the 'beauty of His holiness'

"O worship the Lord in the beauty of holiness; tremble before and reverently fear Him, all the earth". Psalm 96:6 (AMP)

'Holiness is defined in Leviticus 19 by how you treat people, how you treat God and how you worship. God's intention (is) to portray a people separated to Himself while engaging the pagan culture.' [Leilani Haywood]

our reward – heaven's perspective secondly: a vision of earth: enabled to discern God's working/ hand in the affairs of mankind. "So Jesus answered them, "I tell you the solemn truth, the Son can do nothing on his own initiative, but only what he sees the Father doing. For whatever the Father does, the Son does likewise." **John 5:19 (NET)**

thirdly: vision of self and context – desperate need of redemption.

As fear is the antithesis of faith, so **shame is to glory**. Exposure to God's glory makes Isaiah come undone, as he cries:

'...Too bad for me! I am destroyed, for my lips are contaminated by sin, and I live among people whose lips are contaminated by sin...'

> **Isaiah 6:5 (NET)** (emphasis mine)

Isaiah too demonstrated pride in that in the first five chapters he sees only the sins of others. However, upon seeing God Isaiah saw his own sinful need.

true worship leads to deep repentance.

contrition brings restoration and healing

Healing brings intercession – when he sees himself...within the context of his culture and he gets delivered from the 'us/meand-them'-perspective judgementalism or prejudice.

brings a personal commission
