

loose in morals and conduct, uncontrolled and fierce, haters of good. [They will be] treacherous [betrayers], rash, [and] inflated with self-conceit. [They will be] lovers of sensual pleasures and vain amusements more than and rather than lovers of God."

1. An exaggerated sense of selfimportance

## example:

- exaggerates achievements and talents
- expects to be recognized as superior without commensurate achievements



2. Preoccupation with fantasies of unlimited success, power, brilliance, beauty, or ideal love

#### translation:

Narcissists cultivate solipsistic or "autistic" fantasies, which is to say that they live in their own little worlds (and react with affront when reality dares to intrude).

3. Believes he / she is "special" and can only be understood by, or should associate with, other special or high-status people (or institutions)

#### translation:

Narcissists think that everyone who is not special and superior is worthless. By definition, normal, ordinary, and average aren't special and superior, and so, to narcissists, they are worthless.

## 4. Requires excessive admiration

#### translation:

Excessive in two ways: they want praise, compliments, deference, and expressions of envy all the time, and they want to be told that everything they do is better than what others can do. Sincerity is not an issue here; all that matter are frequency and volume

### 5. Has a sense of entitlement

#### translation:

They expect automatic compliance with their wishes or especially favorable treatment, such as thinking that they should always be able to go first and that other people should stop whatever they're doing to do what the narcissists want, and may react with hurt or rage when these expectations are frustrated.

# 6. Selfishly takes advantage of others to achieve his own ends

#### translation:

Narcissists use other people to get what they want without caring about the cost to the other people.

#### translation:

They are unwilling to recognize or sympathize with other people's feelings and needs. They "tune out" when other people want to talk about their own problems. In clinical terms, empathy is the ability to recognize and interpret other people's emotions.

#### translation:

Lack of empathy may take two different directions: (a) accurate interpretation of others' emotions with no concern for others' distress, which is characteristic of psychopaths; and (b) the inability to recognize and accurately interpret other people's emotions, which is the NPD style.

#### translation:


This second form of defective empathy may (rarely) go so far as alexithymia, or no words for emotions, and is found with psychosomatic illnesses, i.e., medical conditions in which emotion is experienced somatically rather than psychically.


#### translation:


People with personality disorders don't have the normal body-ego identification and regard their bodies only instrumentally, i.e., as tools to use to get what they want, or, in bad states, as torture chambers that inflict on them meaningless suffering.

#### translation:

Self-described narcissists who've written to me say that they are aware that their feelings are different from other people's, mostly that they feel less, both in strength and variety (and which the narcissists interpret as evidence of their own superiority);








translation:

the godly ...

focus on the failures of others

are overwhelmed with a sense of their own spiritual need

have a critical, faultfinding spirit

are compassionate

are self-righteous

seek to esteem all others better than themselves

have an independent, self-sufficient spirit

have a healthy interdependence

the godly ...

have to prove that they are right

willing to yield the right to be right

assertive and claim their rights

yield their rights; they have a meek spirit

are self-protective of their time, rights, and reputation

are self-denying

the godly ...

desire to be served

motivated to serve others

aspire after and obsess over success

motivated to be faithful and to make others a success

desire selfadvancement and indulge in selfpromotion desire to promote others and shy away from excessive positive attention

the godly ...

have a drive to be recognized and appreciated

feel wounded when others are promoted and they are overlooked

have both a conscious and subconscious sense of having much to offer God have a sense of their own unworthiness

eager for others to get the credit

have a profound understanding of their own bankruptcy

the godly ...

feel confident in how much they know, thus have a burning desire to teach and correct others are humbled by how very much they have to learn, thus remaining disciples who are teaching and receptive

are self-conscious, but ironically out of touch with their true emotions not overly concerned with self at all, but ironically keenly selfaware

the godly ...

keep others at arms' length

are willing to risk getting close to others and to make themselves vulnerable

quick to blame others

accept personal responsibility and liability

unapproachable or defensive when criticized or corrected

receive criticism or correction with a humble, gracious demeanour

the godly ...

concerned with personal image management and reputational risk

find it difficult to share their spiritual need with others

want to be sure that no one finds out when they have sinned concerned with being authentic/real

willing to be open and transparent with others as God directs

once broken, don't care who knows or who finds out

the godly ...

have a hard time saying, "I was wrong; will you please forgive me?"

tend to deal in generalities when confessing sin

concerned about the consequences of their sin

quick to admit failure and to seek forgiveness when necessary

able to acknowledge specifics when confessing their sin

grieved over the cause, the root of their sin

the godly ...

remorseful over their sin, sorry that they got found out or caught

truly, genuinely repentant over their sin

wait for the other to come and ask forgiveness

take the initiative to be reconciled

the godly ...

compare themselves, and compete with others and feel worthy of honor

compare themselves to the holiness of God and feel a desperate need for His mercy

blind to their true heart condition

are transparent; they 'walk in the light'

don't think they have anything to repent of

realize they have need of a continual heart attitude of repentance

the godly ...

don't think they need revival, but they are sure that everyone else does

continually sense their need for a fresh encounter with God and for a fresh filling of His Holy Spirit
