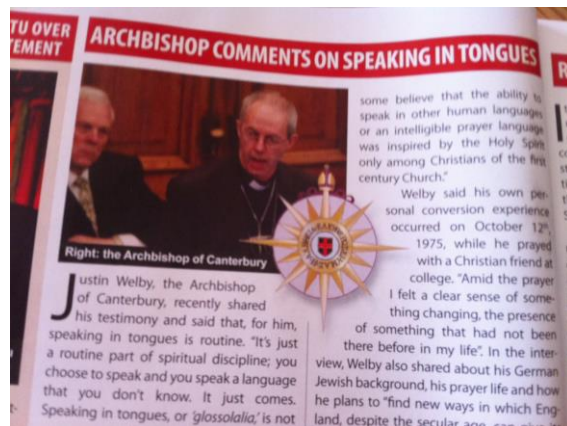

Justin Welby, the Archbishop of Canterbury, recently shared his testimony and said that, for him, speaking in tongues is routine. "It's just a routine part of spiritual discipline; you choose to speak and you speak a language that you don't know. It just comes. Speaking in tongues, or 'glossolalia,' is not

American pastor Mark Driscoll of Mars Hill Church in Seattle, recently spoke on the gift of tongues as described in the New Testament. The sometimes controversial, self-described Reformed, Evangelical, Christian minister, laid out his arguments as to why he believes the gift of speaking in tongues did not end with the Apostles in the first century. Cessationists, such as influential pastor and traditionalist John MacArthur, believe that 1 Corinthians 13:8 and other Biblical passages indicate that the divine ability to speak in other languages or an unknown tongue ended with the Apostles' deaths, as did prophetic revelations and faith-healings through individuals.

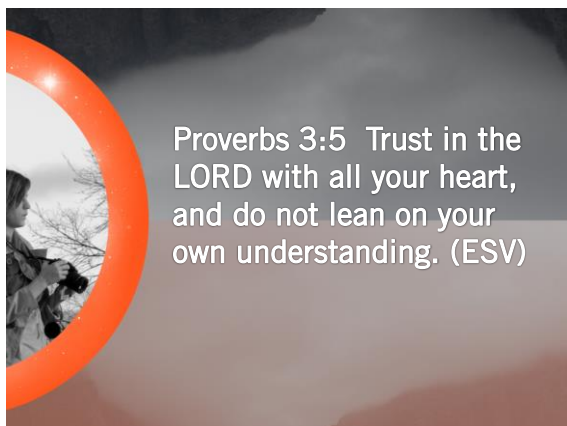

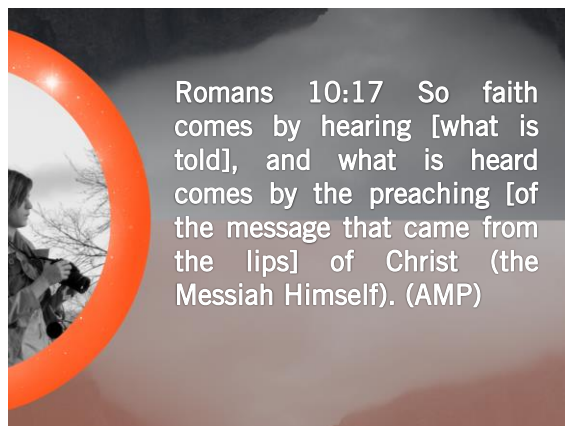

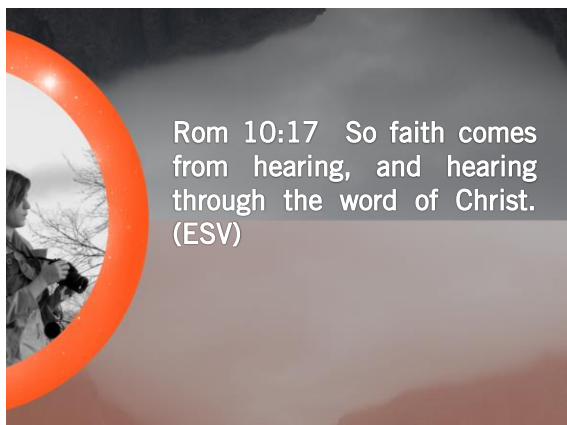
We see often in the Psalms that we must trust God or how the psalmist trusted God.
Psalms 20.7; 25.2; 37.3; 40.3; 62.8



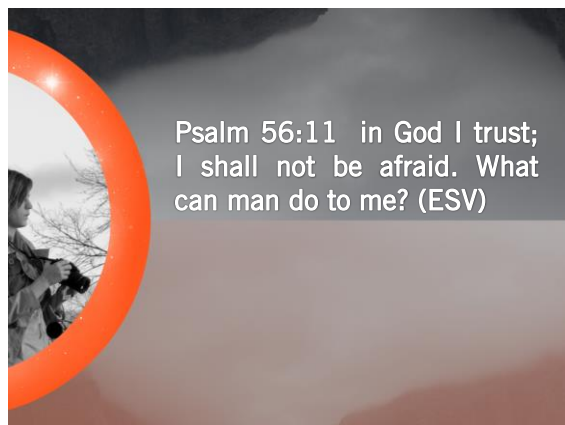
Proverbs 3:5 Trust in the LORD with all your heart, and do not lean on your own understanding. (ESV)



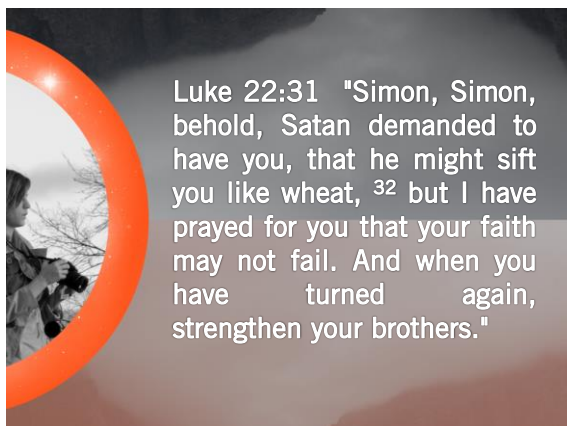

Psalm 56:11 in God I trust; I shall not be afraid. What can man do to me? (ESV)






